Make Water Work loss is just Peachy

In their ongoing tug of war for the title of water champion, Armstrong Mayor Chris Pieper ceded a loss to Peachland's Cindy Fortin in the Make Water Work campaign.

"We didn't really get going on it this year, because of other things going on around our community," Pieper said of the pandemic and fire "I hate activity. to make excuses but...you can't come from behind if you never get behind."

Organized by the Okanagan Basin Water Board (OBWB), the annual challenge pits communities against each other to see which can get the most pledges from residents committed to using water conservation methods.

After Oliver won the first year in 2014, the title has since bounced between Armstrong and Peachland, with this community earning it in 2015, 2017, 2018 and 2020.

As a result, with both holding the mayor's seat throughout those years, the initiative has created a friendly rivalry between Pieper and Fortin, with the latter admitting it's a driving force.

"When I first started to ask people to pledge, I was looking to win against Armstrong," she joked.


While he may have lost the challenge, however, Pieper refused to lose the war of the words.

"I congratulated Mayor Cindy Fortin, she put her mind to kicking my butt and did a good job, but she'll probably lose again next year," he said, laughing.
